

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# A Gardening Collaboration

With a mini-grant from Healthy Northern Kennebec, <u>The Children's Place</u> preschoolers and <u>Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School</u> <u>Program</u>/Waterville Alternative Ed teens are collaborating on a gardening project. Grant funds were used to purchase indoor greenhouses,

gardening supplies, and materials to build four raised beds to add to our existing four.



Sign up for our monthly <u>e-newsletter</u> Several weeks ago, the teens visited the preschoolers to read the book The Dandelion Seed by Joseph Anthony, and work together on an arts-and-crafts project about seeds.

For preschoolers, gardening is a wonderful way to use their scientific investigation skills with their five senses to explore, observe, classify, predict and communicate the life cycle of plants, as well as pick and taste the vegetables they grow.

For the teens, mentoring the younger children is a gift to everyone involved. And, as well as learning about gardening and sharing responsibility for the care of the plants, the teens will be able to harvest and utilize the produce with their families.

On April 27, staff from Johnny's Selected Seeds brought soil, seeds and plant pots, and joined both groups for some early planting for the indoor greenhouses.

The raised beds are being built by the teens (with preschool oversight, of course) and outdoor planting is expected later in May.

We are anticipating the continuation of this collaboration between The Children's Place and Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program/Waterville Alternative Education beyond this year's growing season. Next year, we hope to expand with an outdoor greenhouse, an arrangement for the teens to work with Cooperative Extension to learn about





preserving the harvested crop, cooking classes and continued interaction between the preschoolers and teens.

# Partnership with the Harold Alfond Scholarship Foundation

Colleen Quint, president and CEO of the <u>Alfond Scholarship</u> <u>Foundation</u> (ASF), recently met with leadership from The Maine Children's Home to review several opportunities for partnership.

There are tremendous benefits available through the Alfond Scholarship Foundation for children attending <u>The Children's Place Early Care and</u> <u>Education Center</u>, children connected to the <u>Sharon Abrams Teen</u> <u>Parents School</u>, and Maine Children's Home staff and their children.

The Alfond Scholarship Foundation is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization with a goal of increasing Maine's educational attainment through increased college savings. ASF is a supporting organization of the following Maine educational and nonprofit entities: Educate Maine, Maine Community College system, University of Maine system, Maine Community Foundation, the Mitchell Institute and the Finance Authority of Maine.

The Alfond Scholarship Foundation was created in 2008, when the Harold Alfond Foundation made a commitment to provide \$500 to every Maine resident baby for college. As of April of 2016, more than \$35 million has been invested for more than 70,000 Maine children.


