Greetings from <u>The Maine Children's Home for</u> <u>Little Wanderers</u> campus in Waterville.

As I sit here and type this note I am joyfully interrupted by the sounds of toddlers from <a href="The-Children's Place">The Children's Place</a> playing outside. It is a reminder of the core of our mission, "to build and strengthen families and their children, instilling hope for the future and a better quality of life."

We are working hard to provide tools, resources and support to help Maine children and families to be able to enjoy all the good things in life that we would want for our own children.

This month, we are sharing particular joy in the <u>Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School Program</u>. This incredible collaboration is bearing fruit with eight graduates this year! We are very proud of their dedication and commitment. We celebrate their bright plans for the future, for school, for careers, and as parents. This empowerment model is giving young parents the tools to change the course of their own lives. One of the students last week shared that she is deeply thankful for all the people who have believed in her and given her support to be successful here. She shared her goals for school and work, and one of her top priorities is "... to move off the welfare system to be independent and to take care of all of her son's needs herself." She is grateful for this springboard for a better life for herself and for her son.

We are very proud of the graduation success rate for the Sharon Abrams Teen Parent School of more than 80 percent based on longitudinal surveys of former students (2015). Data from the America's Promise Alliance indicates only 40 percent of U.S. teen moms will finish high school, and although the U.S. teen birth rate is now at an all-time low, nearly three in 10 girls in this country will become pregnant before the age of 20. The need for this support remains consistent.

We are deeply grateful for the partnership with the Waterville School system, many volunteers and donors, and having the counseling, case management and early care on our campus to provide effective supports.

## Send a Kid to Camp!

We need your help to get more kids to camp. Summer camp changes kids' lives for the better.

We have already registered 70 children for summer camp through the <u>Summer Camp Scholarship Program</u>, with nearly 100 more children on the waiting list for their life-changing week.

We have donations and commitments of more than \$20,500 but need to raise at least \$9,500 more by mid-June to meet our \$30,000 goal. It only takes \$250 to sponsor one child for a week at overnight camp.

Though we are incredibly fortunate to have contributions from the George Keller Campership Fund, private donations, corporate and foundation support, and gifts from the <u>Friends of the Maine Children's Home</u>, more support is needed.

"Dear Mrs. Sawyer: Thank you for giving me a scholarship to camp. I went to Camp Fairhaven. I got to use the Blob and I went almost 4 feet high. My favorite thing was swimming and I passed the swim test. I made a new friend named Jonah and I got to sleep on the top bunk! I had a really fun week. Thanks again. Your friend, Simon"

"My children and I have just moved into the shelter and were given applications for a camp scholarship. As you know, all children of domestic violence have so much to gain from an experience at summer camp and I know my children will too. Thank you for this opportunity."

Each year, The Maine Children's Home and many supporters work to send 120 Maine children to summer camp through the Summer Camp Scholarship Program.

Since 1967, the agency has conducted an annual special fundraising campaign to provide an overnight camping experience for children who could not afford to attend otherwise. The activities, friendships, and positive role models they experience in that one week can shape a child's character in enduring ways.
